

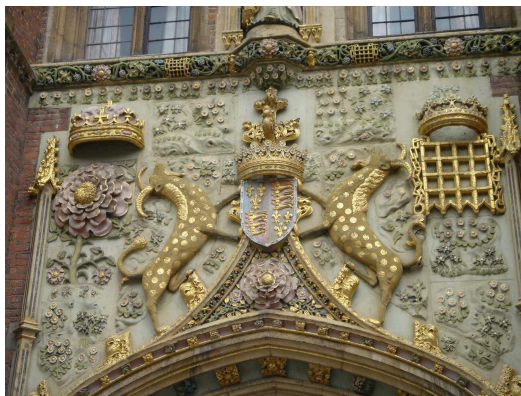
Animals in Architecture: The Cambridge Information leaflet
